

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








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There are many things to discover around SLO

The city of San Luis Obispo has many faces. It is the seat of county government, a business and shopping center, and a traditional college town.

To sample the "SLO life", as locals refer to it, put on your walking shoes and start at the San Luis Obispo de Tolosa mission, the fifth in the mission chain in California.

Some must-sees are the Ah Louis Store at 800 Palm Street. Constructed in 1874, it was the supply station for Chinese laborers who built the railroad tunnels through the mountains of the Cuesta Grade. Other historic buildings include the Sinsheimer store with an iron front, built in 1884, at 849 Monterey Street, the Jack House at 536 Marsh Street, which was built in 1875 and the State Historical Landmark Dallidet Adobe at 1185 Pacific Street, is open Fridays and Sundays.

Visit the History Center of San Luis Obispo County on Monterey Street where an extensive collection of area artifacts are displayed. The museum is housed in the original Carnegie Library built in 1905 with granite from Bishop Peak, one of the Nine Sisters. The sisters are a chain of volcanic peaks stretching from the city to the ocean at Morro Bay along Highway 1.

Drive across town to visit an architectural wonder: the Madonna Inn. Built by the late rancher, Alex Madonna and his wife, Phyllis, it sits in splendor by the side of Highway 101, on Madonna Road.

Horses graze in the white-fenced fields on the property. A quality restaurant is on site and touring the public rooms is a must. You can see the dining room, the wine cellar and be sure not to miss the men's restroom. Even women should take a peek to see the waterfall urinal.

The inn has 109 theme-based rooms and a stay here might have you sleeping in the Safari Room or the Caveman Chamber, or even the Old Mill Room with its own waterfall. There is also a convention center where many special events take place.

After touring the Madonna Inn, drive over to the largest open space in the city, Laguna Lake Park at 504 Madonna Road. Here there are picnic tables and barbecues, large grassy areas, and of course, the lake. Feeding the many domestic and wild ducks and geese is a popular pastime.

There is a nice walking trail along the lakeshore and a launching ramp for kayaks and canoes. Boating on the lake is fun, but best done in the morning hours before the winds come up.

A visit to California Polytechnic University's agricultural center makes for an interesting time. Here there is a full-scale working dairy with Jersey and Holstein cows. There is also the swine unit, horse unit, and chicken house as well as the CalPoly farm. Students in the agricultural division supply produce and dairy products to many local families as well as local supermarkets.

Plant aficionados will enjoy seeing the San Luis Obispo Botanical Garden on Highway 1 at Dairy Creek Road in El Chorro Regional Park. The gardens are a lovely quiet place to stroll or sit and meditate. Mediterranean plantings as well as California natives are part of the landscape and an educational facility is on site where a variety of programs take place. 



Savory food offerings, delectable desserts, and creative cocktails are sure to delight

If hunger drives you to downtown San Luis Obispo, let it take you to Sidecar, a SLO staple known for its luxuriously savory spin on Brussels sprouts and a host of creative cocktails.

Sidecar just launched their new summer lunch menu, and will soon introduce a brand new dinner menu, too. "The dinner menu is going to have a section of street food from around the world, as well as some 'pub fare' options," said owner Josh Christensen.

Also on the horizon for Sidecar is an expansion into the empty space next door to the restaurant, which was previously a bakery. "The additional lounge space will provide an area for patrons to wait for tables on busy nights, or just to hang out with friends with a great cocktail in a relaxing environment. We will also be able to use the new space to host our monthly mixol-

ogy classes, among other events," said Christensen.

The digs

Most of Sidecar's wooden tables, chairs, and antique books came from estate sales. Together they cre-

ate a feeling of "1940s speakeasy" meets "home sweet home." For Christensen, it practically is home.

"I love it here —the restaurant, and the industry as a whole," he said. He's also a fan of the 20-25 employees with whom he shares this passion. "I'm blessed to work in a place I love and care about."

The man

Originally from Albuquerque, Christensen has worked in restaurants since he was 14 and has been a bartender since 19. He came to SLO in 1999, became majority owner of Sidecar in 2013, and is now complete owner with his brother Jeremy Christensen and friend Chris Lee.

The Deals

Sidecar offers a daily happy hour from 3-6pm serving \$7 specialty cocktails, plus \$2 off beer, wine, and other alcoholic beverages. Mule Monday features \$7 mules all night. Tech Tuesday offers 10% off your bill (excluding Happy Hour) for anyone working in the local tech industry.









The eats

The fried brussels are delicately charred and crisp on the outside, tender on the inside, and topped with fresh bleu cheese crumbles

The Sidecar burger is tender and juicy, complemented with sweet bacon maple ketchup, aioli, caramelized onions and smoked mozzarella, and served with a side of truffle fries.

Make sure to check out the

options for the Market Cut (hanger steak, pork chop, short ribs, etc.) and the Market Fish, (local halibut, seared ahi tuna) which are always delicious.

To top it all off, their most popular dessert is the mini donuts with three dipping sauces: Mini donuts with three dipping sauces: chocolate, dulce de leche, and berry coulis. There are several additional mouthwatering options including flourless chocolate torte and mixed fruit gratinado

The sips

Among their house-made bitters and tinctures, Sidecar is known for the smoky, big-flavor Mezcal cocktails. Other popular drinks include the Happy Tackle, made with sage/lemongrass-infused bourbon with simple syrup, Boker's bitters, a frankincense tincture and lemon peel.


San Luis Obispo Railroad Museum

One legendary family offers multiple wine brands: Baileyana-Tangent-True Myth

An Edna Valley Family with a rich history

For over four decades and three generations, the Niven family has farmed their historic Paragon Vineyard located in the heart of San Luis Obispo's beautiful Edna Valley. "My family has been fortunate to farm this extraordinary vineyard and carry on my grandfather's quest of exploring its endless potential," said John H. Niven, Vice President of Sales and Marketing for Baileyana-Tangent-True Myth.

The family's legacy began when founder Jack Niven pioneered the planting of grape vines in the Edna Valley in 1973. Over 40 years later, three winemaking projects are at the core of the family's focus: Baileyana, Tangent, and True Myth. "These wines represent the best of our family's legacy and truly showcase the Edna Valley and it's unique place in the landscape of California wines," shared Niven. "They headline our offerings at our tasting room and are available on wine lists and store shelves in 48 states."

The Niven's Paragon Vineyard is the largest family owned and operated vineyard in the Edna Valley. It spans more than 1,100 acres, producing extraordinary grapes that are used to craft the many wine styles expressed within the family's different brand projects. Additionally, their grapes are sought out by other wineries with a portion of the harvest supplied to select wineries in the region.

Notably, the Paragon Vineyard was part of a pilot program in 2008 aimed at certifying sustainable farming practices in California, as such it was in the first wave of Central Coast vineyards to earn Sustainability in Practice (SIP) certification. Criteria for this certification include growing practices that preserve the natural environment, and business practices that protect the present and future.

Visitors are treated to a memorable wine tasting experience



Traveling down Orcutt Road from San Luis Obispo, the Baileyana-Tangent-True Myth tasting room is the first you will encounter as you enter the Edna Valley. Open from 10am to 5pm year-round, the tasting room is housed in a quaint schoolhouse built by the local farming community in 1909. When in operation, the schoolhouse served students ranging from kindergarten through twelfth grade who hailed from the surrounding farmland areas. Many of the building's original windows, floorboards and ceiling remain intact, offering tasting room guests a glimpse into the past. From the winery, visitors can also take in the gorgeous views across the valley towards the coast.

The wine tasting experience is designed to accommodate all visitors' individual needs, according to Karl Boone, the Winery's Direct to Consumer Manager.

The Niven family's three core brands offer visitors a diversity of wine styles, all crafted by Burgundian winemaker, Christian Rougenant. Baileyana wines are varietal Chardonnay, Pinot Noir and Syrah wines, aged in French oak barrels and include still and sparkling wines. Tangent wines explore the fresh and vibrant alternative whites, which thrive in the relatively cool climate valley, a mere 5.4 miles from the Pacific Ocean. All fermented in stainless steel tanks, these aro-

matic and expressive wines include: Sauvignon Blanc, Albariño, Pinot Gris, Viognier and Grenache Blanc. True Myth represents the best of this county's wine regions: Chardonnay from the cool Edna Valley and Cabernet Sauvignon from the warmer Paso Robles region. Two other smaller production Niven brands are also available at the tasting room: Zocker produces Austrian style white wines and Trenza produces new world red wine blends. By providing such a wide range of wines, the wines showcased at the historic tasting room offer a mix of varietals and blends to suit the preferences of all types of wine drinkers.

Claiborne & Churchill has been producing wine for over three decades

Tasting room in SLO's Edna Valley is open daily

Pounded in 1983 by Claiborne (Clay) Thompson and Fredericka Churchill, Claiborne & Churchill Vintners is a small, family-owned winery devoted to producing Alsatian-style wines in California's pastoral Edna Valley appellation.

Clay and Fredericka met while teaching Old Norse and German, respectively, at the University of Michigan in the late 1970s.

Thompson was always an academically-inclined person, having studied abroad, and earned his PhD in Old Norse Language and Literature at Harvard University. He never could have guessed that his first professorial appointment, with the University of Michigan, would also be his last.

"I was invited to UCLA to give a talk on my academic subject and also to Berkeley in May of 1981," he recalled. "Fredericka was visiting her sister in California at the time, so we rented a car and drove up the California coast, stopping along the way at a few wineries."

One of those wineries happened to be Edna Valley Vineyard near San Luis Obispo. "It was really low-key," said Churchill. "No one even knew there was a winery out there at the time, and there were just a couple of employees."

This quick glimpse at the winemaking life spoke to Clay. "I thought, these guys like what they do, and they look happy. They work hard...and they like to work hard!"

That visit, Clay found himself signing on as the third employee of Edna Valley Vineyard. "They didn't quite have me in mind –they were hoping for some young brute – but the overseeing wine master was [California pioneering winemaker] Dick Graff, and he was intrigued by the idea of having a Harvard PhD in the cellar for six dollars an hour."

Clay and Fredericka soon moved to San Luis Obispo, Clay working at Edna Valley Vineyard full-time for five years, and Fredericka working at a bookstore and

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later teaching a few German classes at local university, Cal Poly. "We were newlyweds," said Clay, "we had no money, and we worked all the time."


Looking back, Clay Thompson and Fredericka Churchill, owners of Claiborne & Churchill Winery, or C&C, say they marvel at how stubborn they've been.

"We were always told 'Don't make wine for yourselves – make wine for the market," said Clay, who was C&C's winemaker until Coby Parker-Garcia took over in 2007. "But we just decided not to do that."

"When I was starting to make wine, I'd already had one career and been disappointed," said Clay. "Integrity became very important to me after all the soul-searching I'd done. And it's not integrity if you pander to the market. That's business."

Fredericka said, laughing, "Even though we struggled, it was a good move."

The winery puts a special focus on the dry, fruity, and food-friendly wines of eastern France's Alsace region, namely pinot noir, gewurztraminer and riesling.


Additional Alsatian-style offerings include: pinot gris, pinot blanc, dry muscat, and an edelzwicker that has become somewhat of a cult classic among wine club members. The winery also produces the more familiar chardonnay, several pinot noirs, and syrah.



Sourced from cool-climate vineyards that support these varietals' naturally high acidity and elegance, C&C wines have won critical and popular acclaim for over 30 years. In 2007 Clay passed his position as Winemaker to Coby Parker-Garcia, who continues to emphasize minimal manipulation of both fruit and wine today.





Sentinel of the Sea

Take a tour of the Point San Luis Lighthouse



thanks to a dedicated group of volunteers, it is open for public tours.

The need for a lighthouse in the area became obvious during the late 1800s when Port Harford had hundreds of ships coming in. The fog of the Central Coast made navigation along the rocky shoreline hazardous. Eventually, construction began on the Prairie Victorian model lighthouse and in June of 1890 it was completed.

The Coast Guard decommissioned the station in 1974 and it fell into disrepair. The Point San Luis Lighthouse Keepers, a non-profit organization, was established in 1995 in an effort to save the structure. Now the road is paved and, although quite narrow, it is used for van and trolley tours out to the point.

morning, our group boarded the "Lucy" trolley. After passing through the gates of Diablo, we drove up the long winding road a bit fearful of the edge but overwhelmed by the beauty of the area. At each curve another scene greeted us - Avila Bay, the yacht harbor, Harford Pier, and the wide expanse of the Pacific.

Horn house

Our tour started in the Horn House that housed the 10-inch fog whistle that was used before there were foghorns.

"When the foghorn blew, it was so loud it shook the building," our guide said, "and rattled the windows. So every 30 seconds, when it blew, everyone who worked in that building stopped talking. When these same folks went into town to visit the saloon, others noticed that they spoke with a pause in their speech every 30 seconds."

Also housed in the Horn House is the original fourth order Fresnel lens that was used to send a white flash of light every 30 seconds followed by a red flash of light.

Impressive lighthouse

Next we toured the impressive lighthouse where, after climbing the narrow twisting stairwell that brought us to the lamp house, we were treated to a 360-degree view. The Head Keeper and his family lived in the rooms connected to the lamp house tower. At one time, a double keepers dwelling was on the property where the first and second assistant keepers and their families lived.

Lighthouse Keepers trolley tour program offers docentled tours of Point San Luis Lighthouse Wednesday at noon and Saturday at noon, 1 p.m. and 2 p.m. with return trips on the half-hour; \$20 per person; \$15 ages 2-12. Reservations required, call (855) 533-7843.

Guided tours on Pecho Coast Trail to lighthouse (3.5 miles round trip, hilly terrain) are offered by PG&E; tour of Lighthouse if docent is present (Keeper's fee for entrance \$5 per adult, free for children 12 and under). Pre-registration required, go to pge.modwest. com/pgereservations/trailschild or call PG&E for at (805) 541-TREK.

The beach cities of Shell Beach, Pismo Beach, Oceano and Grover Beach run along the coast connected by first Highway 101 and then Highway 1. It is difficult to tell where one city ends and the next begins. The four cities attract visitors year round for their proximity to the ocean and the variety of activities individuals and families can enjoy.

The main attractions in Shell Beach are the vistas of the Pacific Ocean. Drive down to Ocean Boulevard where parking and a set of stairs provide access to the sandy beach below. There's a perfect lookout gazebo in Margo Dodd park.

Take a picnic basket and enjoy breathtaking sunset views. Fishermen love to cast lines from the stretch of cliffs. Another popular activity is kayaking.

Attractions

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Dinosaur Caves Park

Located at the corner of Cliff Street and Shell Beach Road, Shell Beach. This 11-acre park is popular with walkers, photographers, dog lovers, joggers and fishing enthusiasts. Observe dolphins, whales, sea otters and other sea life as well as sea and shore birds such as gulls, cormorants, and Peregrine falcons.

Oceano Dunes

Thousands flock to the Oceano Dunes State Recreational Park to camp along the ocean in tents and RVs every week. You can rent and ride dune buggies and ATVs on the beach and enjoy riding for the entire afternoon. There is a small cost per vehicle to drive on the beach and it is recommended you have a larger vehicle before attempting to drive on the dry sand; you don't want to get stuck in the dunes.

Pismo Beach Pier

This 1,200-foot pier is a major fishing attraction. For serious recreation, try kayaking, surfing, or scuba diving. For a more relaxed afternoon walk the pier and then head to the downtown area for shopping.




Explore coastal bluffs, caves and more

Head to Shell Beach in search of a perfect place for a picnic

In the past, tribal members of the Chumash held a yearly gathering on the bluffs above the ocean in Central California. Here the males carried on tribal business while the women collected shells on beaches below. These meetings were possibly the first time people picnicked in Shell Beach. You too can enjoy a day's outing by stopping at some of the parks perched atop these cliffs.

Drive down to Ocean Boulevard at Cliff Avenue and stop at Margo Dodd Park. Here you can enjoy the gazebo and gaze out to sea and search for passing whales or watch the brown pelicans, cormorants and gulls that use the cliff sides and sea stacks as resting places. There are barbecues and picnic tables here for your use also.

Continue on Ocean Boulevard and you will come to Eldwayen

Park, a great place to watch the sunset. Here too, you can climb down the stairs to the beach and at low tide explore the tidepools. Picnic tables and benches are located along the cliffs.

The town rests between Pismo Beach, Oceano, and Arroyo Grande and covers a roughly two-mile area. The streets are named after popular beachside resorts, and the town features several parks for visitors to take in the great weather year round.

Drive along the beach in your car, truck or ATV, or rent one, or ride horses on the coastline. Grover Beach hosts the only train station for the beach cities and has a visitors center there at 180 Hwy. 1.

Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Park



Rent an ATV, camp overnight, and enjoy the beach year-round



The beach at the Oceano Dunes is the only beach in California where vehicles are still allowed to drive on the sand. Featured in "Pirates of the Caribbean: At the World's End," the dunes are where visitors can camp and ride all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) on the beach year-round.

Although ATVs are available for rent on the beach, be sure to stop by an ATV rental's storefront as well. One of the best places to learn about ATVs and rent one or two for a day on the beach is at BJ's ATV Rental, located at 197 Grand Ave. in Grover Beach, and the No. 1 rental company in the area since 1982.

Before renting an ATV, be prepared to fill out release and liability forms and get basic safety instruction before being released to ride in the dunes. Zach Zeman with BJ's ATV Rental, said BJ's will not rent ATVs to anyone under the age of nine and reminds everyone that all children should be supervised while riding.

When riding, Zeman recommends dressing in layers, and wearing long pants and closed-toe shoes. "Flip flops and shorts can be very uncomfortable and very dangerous," he said. For more information, see www.bjsatvrentals. com or call (805) 481-5411 or (805) 430-5321.

Ranked as the No. 1 place to stay overnight by Reserve America, Oceano Dunes has always been a popular destination, according to Jim Suty, president of the Friends of the Oceano Dunes. Suty recommends visitors to the county make a trip to the dunes, even for a day, to walk along the sand, hang out at the beach, ride ATVs or small dune buggies, play volleyball, shop in the nearby towns or go for a plane ride.

"There's a myriad of things to do – it all depends on what you're looking for," Suty said.

Before heading out to the dunes, the Friends of the Oceano Dunes offers tips on what to bring and what to do and not to do:

DO arrive at the beach at low tide – find a tide schedule at www.

oceanodunes.org

DO air tires down to 20 lbs. per tire

DO carry a cell phone for emergencies

DO bring extra keys; they are difficult to find if dropped in the sand.

DON'T make sharp turns in the sand

DON'T stop when driving uphill

DON'T ride ATVs with a passenger or without a helmet

DON'T take glass bottles to the beach.

How to get there


From San Luis Obispo, exit Highway 101 at Pismo Beach to Highway 1, turn right at the light in Grover Beach to enter the state park.

Entrance fee is \$5 per vehicle/day. Vehicles should be fit to drive along the beach, as the dunes are two miles from the entrance.







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Explore the historic Village of Arroyo Grande

Take a step back in time with a stroll through town



Step back in time with a visit to the historic Village of Arroyo Grande where most of the shops are situated in historical buildings in the downtown area. Branch Street, the main road through town, is named after Francis Z. Branch who was instrumental in the finding of the town.

The **Rotary Bandstand in Heritage Square Park** on the Village Green is home to musical concerts every Sunday afternoon in summer – bring a lawn chair and a picnic. The park contains several restored historical buildings; the **South County Historical Society** is located in **Heritage House** at 126 S. Mason Street.

Nearby, Mason Street Ruby's House, constructed in the late 1800s, and later restored to its former elegance, is home to the Patricia Loomis History Library and Research Center.

Walk over to the **Santa Manuela Schoolhouse**, a one-room schoolhouse built in 1901. Inside find desks, school books, slates, pictures and more from an earlier era.

The **Barn Museum** nearby is filled with agricultural artifacts, antique vehicles and carriages representing the Arroyo Grande Valley farming. Just steps away, the **Swinging Bridge** spans Arroyo Grande Creek. Originally built in 1875 from rope, with sides added in 1902, and was acquired by the city in 1911. After being damaged beyond repair during a 1995 storm, locals conducted fundraising projects, acquired Federal funding, and rebuilt the 17-foot bridge that rises 40 feet above the creek and is the only one of its kind in California.



 Γ or many people, discovering luffas are plants and not sea creatures is surprising. Deanne, owner of The Luffa Farm in Nipomo, and her family are often asked, "They're sponges, right?"

"A luffa is a plant with an attitude, not unlike an orchid," Deanne said. "You know how it is with orchids - they don't do what you expect." It seems luffas are like that as well.

Deanne's introduction to luffas came when she received a bunch of seeds from a college professor in the Bay area many years ago; she and her family members took the seeds but had no idea what they were.

"We all thought they might be watermelon seeds," she says. "We went to the library and we looked through books to try and find out what they were."

Finally deciding that the seeds were some kind of Chinese cucumber plant, they planted the seeds in their individual gardens. Deanne planted hers up against fencing. As they grew, she attached fishing line to the fence, the vines took to them, and gourds began to form. As time passed, she finally checked on the plants and found that the gourds had turned brown, dried out, and appeared dead. She picked peeled off the outer skin and, beher long journey as a luffa farmer.

Nowadays Deane grows her plants in pots in two large greenhouses."I tried growing them here in the ground but the gophers just attacked them," she says, "then when the afternoon winds came up, as they do in Nipomo, it blew the blossoms right off the plants. No blossoms, no luffas."

Take a tour, visit gift shop

The luffa gourd develops at the base of the flower, grow downward at one-half inch daily, and more than one gourd grows on a vine. When some magical moment occurs inside the gourd, it turns off its growing mechanism and begins to change from bright green to yellow and, finally, to brown. It will be hard and dry – shake the gourd and the seeds inside will rattle -and then it's picking time.

A tour of the Luffa Farm begins with a comparison of commercial luffas grown in other countries and imported here; these other plants are chemically-handled, affecting the feel of the luffas to become stiff and abrasive. Deanne's luffas, however, have a slight amount of stiffness, but are essentially soft.

"You can use them to wash the car if you want to," she says. "Our

dishwasher or the washing machine.


After a tour, stop by the gift shop. Deanne also grows a variety of aromatic and healing herbs, using them in products such as handpoured glycerin soaps, lotions, bath salts, sachets, bath fizzlers and teas, eye masks, and neck wraps.





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Rent a kayak and explore the Central Coast

Kayak outfitters offer ocean and lake tours

Slipping down a channel in the Morro Bay estuary, kayaks glide by shorebirds feeding in the pickleweed and float peacefully past harbor seals resting on mudflats – just one scene of many among the paddling world of the Central Coast. Kayaking is relatively easy and most people can learn how after just a few basic instructions.

Outfitters guide kayakers on how to get in and out of boats, hold and use paddles, and share helpful tips about the many areas available to paddle through. Most kayak outfitters also give tours – often the best way to get started kayaking.

It is important to always wear a personal flotation device (PFD), sometimes referred to as a life jacket, while kayaking. In general, sea kayaks are more flat-bottomed than river kayaks so people are less likely to fall out, but it is wise to be prepared as the waters of the Central Coast are cold.

San Simeon & Cambria

Good spots to go kayaking include the north coast at the William Randolph Hearst State Beach, located across from the entrance to Hearst Castle, where kayak outfitters are often present on the beach. Entry into the ocean is fairly easy as the beach is located in a protected cove. Once beyond that sandy shoreline, kayakers paddle in the open ocean; waves are calm during summer months and the paddling should be easy.



Just down the coast is Leffingwell Landing in Cambria, a popular launching spot for kayakers. Here the surf may be slightly more challenging, but once beyond the breakers kayakers drift through kelp beds and may glimpse sea otters resting or feeding.

Cayucos & Morro Bay

Outfitters in the beach town of Cayucos offer tours and sea kayaking lessons, and there is a relatively easy launching place near the pier. If you are lucky you might paddle out to see some passing Humpback whales or dolphins.

One of the easiest places to go for first-time paddlers is at Morro Bay where there are kayak outfitters up and down the Embarcadero and also at the State Park Marina. The inner bay area is calm with no waves – launch from a dock, Coleman Beach on the Embarcadero, Windy Cove in the State Park, or from the boat launch ramp.

Pack a picnic and paddle over to the sand spit, beach your boat, and hike up the dunes to enjoy lunch. Depending on the tide, there are opportunities to kayak into the back bay and the estuary to see a variety of the 200 bird species that migrate to the area as well as harbor seals, sea lions, and sea otters.


Along with calm water paddling, many avid kayakers enjoy kayak surfing and often take advantage of the larger waves north of Morro Rock and at Montana de Oro. Waves are always larger during winter months and smaller and gentler during summer months.

South County & lake kayaking

In South County, outfitters in Shell Beach take kayakers to launching spots and instruct on paddling near cliffside caves. For those wanting to learn sea kayaking, one the easiest beaches to launch from is Avila Beach. Located on San Luis Bay, it rarely has large waves so it's easy to paddle out past the breakers. From there, paddle along the coastline under the Cal Poly pier and through the kelp beds up to the Shell Beach cliffs where to catch a glimpse of brown pelicans roosting.


In addition to the bays and oceans, be sure to check out Lopez Lake near Arroyo Grande and, in North County there's Santa Margarita Lake, Atascadero Lake Park, Lake Nacimiento, and San Antonio. Paddling on these lakes is optimal during the early hours of the day or in the evening to avoid winds that generally blow throughout the major part of the day.

Enjoy hiking in Morro Bay

There are various options for hikers of all levels



Morro Bay is rich with natural beauty, and there is no better way to experience it them by hiking. There are numerous trails that can accommodate a variety of outdoor leisure activities.

A great easy hike, perfect for a brisk fall morning, is black hill, the second to last of nine volcanic peaks that lie between San Luis Obispo and Morro Bay - the last being Morro Rock itself. Morro Rock, a sacred space for two local Native American tribes, is not hikeable except with a special permit. The distance from the Morro Bay State Park campground to the top of Black Hill and back is approximately three miles with an elevation gain of 600 feet. This scenic and enjoyable hike is relatively easy and can be done in just an hour or

Just south of Morro Bay is beautiful Montana De Oro State Park. Montana De Oro is Spanish for, "Mountains of gold," and refers to the small yellow flowers that bloom throughout the park. There are numerous hiking trails through the

park, including Bluff Trail, a level coastal trail, which is suitable for bikes and wheelchairs. It is about 2.1 miles long one way with a host of side trails that allow for outings between one and five miles. The hike is the perfect way to see all the tide pools, beaches, rock islands, and natural bridges, along the stunning coastline of the park, hitting highlights like Corallina Cove, Quarry Cove, and Grotto Rock.

Start from the north end of the Bluff Trail at a parking area on Pecho Valley Road just past the visitor center and across from the trailhead for Valencia Peak. More adventurous hikers can continue up Valencia Peak, one of the highest summits in the park. It provides arguably some of the best views of the park's stunning shoreline and inviting inland peaks. About 3.7-miles round trip, there is 1,275 feet of elevation to tackle, with a few level steps allowing you to catch your breath amidst the scenic climb to the amazing 360-degree views from the summit.

Wave of the Future



Harmony is one paved street off of SR 1. The main structure is a "U" shaped building, the former creamery, with the open area being a small plaza. On the far side of the structure is the Harmony Pottery Shop. On the near side is the former post office and a lounge for visitors.

Harmony Valley Creamery

In a town where nothing is exactly 'normal', the folks at Harmony Valley Creamery know what it takes to create awesome craft ice cream, made in small batches that delight the taste buds of locals and visitors alike. Founded in 1913 around a burgeoning local dairy industry, the formation of the Harmony Valley Creamery Association would see Harmony serve as the capital of Central Coast dairy production for nearly half a century.

Harmony Chapel





Wearable items from purses, socks, sweaters, vests, caps and more are found in corners, between display racks, and nooks throughout the store. Beautifully handcrafted buttons, crochet hooks and knitting needles, many from reclaimed wood, patterns, kits, looms, and spinning and felting supplies can all be found in the 1800 square foot store.

Owners, Kris Gregson and Oz Barron, and the store's highly knowledgeable staff welcome everyone.



"We welcome everyone of every skill level," said Barron. "Whatever you want to do with this colored string we are here to help you." Gregson and Barron's philosophy can be summed up in the slogan, "Give us twenty minutes and we'll give you the basics," said Gregson. "We like people to bring us their project

questions to get started, or how to master a technique. We can show you exactly what you need to do. We love helping people this way."

The store carries every kind of yarn from acrylic to hand spun and dyed natural fibers. Ball & Skein & More is one of the largest retailer of the fair trade yarn from the Manos del Uruguay women's cooperative. The racks are filled with yarns from 90 vendors including Berroco, Mrs. Crosby, Trendsetter Mountain Colors, Noro and Plymouth.

Barron said, "We're the largest shop on the Central Coast and among the larger shops in the country. Pretty amazing for a store in a town of around 6,000."

Barron said, "We have one of the largest collections of yarn west of the Mississippi and are one of five shops in San Luis Obispo County. Not bad for a store in a town of around 6,000." Even though a percentage of



the shops sales are online through the website, www.cambriavarn. com, Gregson and Barron believe supporting the local community is important. A popular local event is "Stitching in your slippers," every Friday and Sunday from 10:30 -4. "Just come by and bring your project," said Gregson. "I don't recall anyone actually showing up in slippers. The idea is to get together in a creative environment and learn from each other and meet fellow fiber fans." Gregson said people drift in and out on those days. "Some stay for an hour or so and some stay the entire day. It's an amazing exchange of skill and creativity."


Charles Paddock Zoo







The adults say it's fun, the kids call it cool and everyone agrees that it's an unforgettable experience—welcome to Margarita Adventures zipline canopy tours, the biggest thrill in wine country.

Located on the historic Santa Margarita Ranch, the full zipline course includes six distinct ziplines, and optional wine tasting, spanning more than 7,500 combined feet. During the tour you see forests, canyons and wide-open views of vineyards and mountains. There is the 1,300-foot Renegade which soars over a valley with breathtaking 360-degree views. The Woodlander glides along the top of native blue and white oaks. Stop by the Pine Street Saloon

A country saloon with character

Before Toby Keith and Willie Nelson recorded "Beer For My Horses" the Pine Street Saloon was serving whisky for the men and beer for the horses on Pioneer Day in Paso Robles for 30 something years. This Saloon is housed in one of Paso Robles' oldest buildings (cir 1857) and, as rumor has it and story tells it, has a colorful history. That history includes names like Jesse James, being a bordello, being owned at one time by the Blackburn family, who are founders of the town, along with names such as James Drury, Jesse and Frank James Uncle.

Regarding the horses coming in the Saloon owner Ron French said, "People get a real kick out of it (hopefully not from a horse), and how often do you get to have a beer with a horse?" Ron and his mom, Pat French, own the establishment on Pine Street. During the 1880s

there were over a dozen saloons and bars between 13th and 10th streets and there were Saturday night dances and horse races as well.

The opportunity to literally saddle up to the bar might be unique, but it's not the only thing that sets this bar apart from the rest. Incredible hometown hospitality, daily drink specials, and that country ethos make the Pine Street Saloon an essential stop for anyone looking to enjoy a cold beer in a down to Earth environment.

Safe rides

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"We go out of our way to take care of customers," said French. A few years ago, the saloon acquired its own limousine, which French uses to pick up and deliver a Safe Ride to customers when they don't have a sober driver on hand. Because he wants everyone to enjoy a safe night on the town, he'll take you anywhere within city limits, and all for free – though that kind of service warrants a generous tip to the limo driver!

"It's really popular with folks staying at the hotels," said French. "If you don't have a designated driver and can't afford a cab, we want to make sure you don't do anything that's going to get someone hurt." As a matter of fact, French gave actor Gary Busey a ride back to Hollywood in the limo – check out the picture at the Saloon. But even free limo rides don't reach the extent of the bar's helpful hospitality; Ron helps some find a room where they can sleep it off.

Haunted saloon?

But beware. The Saloon is rumored to be haunted, and was even the subject of an episode of the Travel Channel's hit show, The Dead Files.

"I don't really believe in ghosts or any of that," said French. "It's an old wooden building with creaky noises." Many guests tell us stories of noises, pans falling in the kitchen, and things moving. Out of curiosity, French set up night vision cameras in the hall corridor and has video footage of what he calls "super charged dust particles" that appear to glow, travel through glass, and zip

around the room even when the air is still. And there are the videos of lamps and an old vacuum cleaner moving across the floor late at night.

French said that he was able to provide 25 people to speak with the



producers who have had ghostly experiences within the bar, as well as some footage caught on his nightvision cameras.

The premise of Dead Files is that a retired homicide detective and a medium, "combine their sixth senses to investigate haunted locations where a deadly crime was committed." Steve DiSchiavi is a retired detective with more than 20 years of experience with the New York City Police Department, and Amy Allan is a paranormal researcher and psychic who has worked with many private investigators and police agencies. In each episode, the duo investigates a case independently and keep their findings hidden from each other to preserve the integrity of their discoveries. At the episode's end, DiSchiavi and Allan share with the property owner what they discover.

Live music

Live music is a key element of the entertainment at the Saloon. Past performers include Paula Nelson, Willie Nelson's daughter; country star Kacey Musgraves; Kenny Lee Lewis, lead guitar for the Steve Miller Band; Travis Howard, who has written a dozen of Miranda Lambert's songs; Ramblin' Jack Elliott; Louie Ortega; actors Gary Busey and Robert Carradine and more.

"We're a country bar through and through," said French. "We've

got about 10 local bands that play here regularly. We keep them on a kind of rotating schedule and mix in an out of town act every once in a while to keep it from getting stale."

During the day, the Pine Street Saloon is a quiet place to relax and visit with neighbors and friends, but it's a bit different at night. There's always something fun happening, and the night time activities are guaranteed to draw a crowd, with Sunday's Karaoke, Monday's Open Mic, Tuesday's Karaoke, Wednesday's Open Band Night, the Thursday North County Line Series, Friday night Karaoke and live bands on Saturday.

A bit unrefined

There's little about the bar that could be called "refined," and there are no fancy frills. The jukebox plays both kinds of music: country and western. The decorations consist of historic signs and pictures, animal heads and old concert flyers. Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights there is a food trailer in the back yard with some very fine food. It's a cash only establishment, but they do have an ATM inside for those that only brought their credit cards.

"We can make those foo-foo drinks, but they're not very popular around here," said French. "Our specialties are beer or Jack and Coke, nice and simple...It ain't a wine bar, that's for sure." And you can shoot a game of pool, or hang in the new backyard till the cows come home.

The simple, no nonsense formula of cold beer and good service has


worked at Pine Street Saloon for 40 years. It's a family operation that started in 1971 under Pat French. For most of its run, the business was in the building next door to its current location, but the family always had their eye on the old brothel as a perfect drink house. They moved the business in 2002 just in time for the big earthquake that damaged several buildings in the area, including the brick building that had housed the bar. It was torn down, and but the new location suffered nothing more than a slight tilt. If you look carefully at the front entrance, you can see that the wooden building leans a little to the right.


"This place was built to last," said French. "We did some retrofits to reinforce the walls and make sure it was safe."

After the move, Pat handed the reins to Ron, but she still gets behind the bar to serve drinks every now and again. Ron's son works in the bar as well, making it a third generation business. "Mom started it. I'm keeping it going, and Danny's keeping it stocked with beer and spirits," said French.

Calwise's signature offering is the "Big Sur Gin" (\$35), which is distilled from locally sourced wine grapes and infused with 12 organic wild herbs that are largely native to the iconic Big Sur coastline, including sage, yerba santa, bay, fennel, and elderberry.

As a Central Coast native and an outdoorsman who studied plant sci-

ences at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, Bergh alighted on the idea of Big Sur Gin while hiking in the region's oceanfront mountains.

"I've been hiking around the Central Coast for years, and wanted to capture the aromas and flavors I found in the wild," he said. "I wanted to remain true to juniper being the classic central gin ingredient, but in addition to the other traditional botanicals such as coriander and citrus peel, I decided to explore using these native herbs. After a multitude of test batches, I finally found the perfect blend for creating this taste of what I call 'Liquid California."

The results have been immediate, as the Big Sur Gin has already earned a Best of Show medal at the 2017 Wine & Spirits Wholesalers of America's Annual Convention & Exposition, and a gold medal at the 2017 Los Angeles International

Wine & Spirits Competition.

Another signature Calwise offering is the "Blonde Rum" (\$33), which is fermented with U.S.-grown raw sugar cane and matured in retired wine barrels used in local chardonnay production, resulting in a rum that is "as bright as the sun and as crisp as an ocean breeze."

New Custom Distillery & Tasting Room

Buoyed by the success of his inaugural creations, Bergh is now con-



fidently moving forward with the buildout of his new 6,000-square-foot distillery and tasting room. To date, he has been producing his spirits in collaboration with a distillery in San Diego.

The centerpiece of the distillery is a still that has been customized to Bergh's specific modifications. In addition to tasting flights of rum and gin, the tasting room will serve proprietary Calwise cocktails. A small menu will feature light bites such as locally made flatbread pizzas and bacon-wrapped dates. The visitor area will include a redwood bar and seating at copper tables. In addition

to signature Calwise offerings, the distillery will feature special-batch spirits including a barrel-aged gin.

"This is going to be a hub of creativity and experimentation, and it is going to drive the next chapter for Calwise Spirits," Bergh said. "I'm stoked to finally have my own home."

Calwise Distillery is located near "Tin City" at 3340 Ramada Dr suite B, in Paso Robles. Their tasting room is open Thursday Friday from 4-9 p.m. and Saturday and Sunday from 12-9 p.m. For more information call (805) 369-2662 or visit calwisespirits.com.



A connection to the community was a part of Laddon's vision from

day one - a wide range of innovative programs are offered to engage and inspire the artist within each of us! Adults and children are encouraged to explore the visual arts and creative process through a diverse lineup of lectures, workshops, activities, exhibition-related special events and more. With its Kids Art Smart program, the nonprofit provides free, hands-on art classes to more than 6,000 local elementary and middle school children every year. Exhibitions are a vital part of Studios on the Park as well. They bring creativity to life through dynamic displays that showcase artwork of regional and national significance. With the knowledge they gained through being in a wine loving family, Jake and Josh knew what it would take to produce great wine, and to distribute it and create a successful, flourishing winery.




The brothers source the grapes from 19 different vineyards in the area, keeping their unique blends super local. The label art on each

bottle variety is prominent and brightly illustrated, featuring clever and usually hilarious names, all made from hand carved blocks by

childhood friend of the winemakers, Joe Kalionzes. One of their popular wines, Sofa King Bueno features a skeletal female figure against a bright blue background, inspired by Day of the Dead sugar skulls. The area is known for its rustic zinfandel, and the cool nights and warm days make the grapes very happy! Dynamic fruit tones of strawberry, cranberry, black raspberry and mulberry fuse with alluring vanilla and clove, all which can be discerned in their wines.

On the west side of Paso Robles, the Chronic Cellar tasting room is situated directly across the street from where the wine is made, at the Peachy Canyon facility. Outside the building you'll find a nice patio area, where dogs are



welcomed with water, and families can play cornhole or horseshoes on the lawn area. The staff ensures that each visitor or group feels at home, and are treated like family while they visit. Many parts of the business are kept within the family, giving Chronic Cellars the intimate, comfortable vibe it's famous for. The laid back atmosphere in the tasting room serves up some scrumptious wines, and the flight is full of 7 special blends, that you can enjoy with a local Vivant cheese box. Sharing their smaller cases of wine at the tasting room, visitors get an insight into the "cult-like" following that has developed around the wines. 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Enjoy sparkling wines made in the traditional way at Vino Vargas

'Paso Doble' sparkling wine released at the end of the new harvest each year

Vino Vargas winery, located in San Miguel just north of Paso Robles, offers delicious sparkling wines made in the traditional way. Vino Vargas Paso Doble sparkling wine is just one of the many awardwinning wines available through the wine club or by visiting the winery.

Each year the wine is released at the end of the new harvest at the Vargas Harvest Winemaker Dinner. The festivities begin when Winemaker Pedro Vargas' wife, Vicky, a certified sommelier, sabers a bottle to celebrate the occasion. This year the dinner is Nov. 10th and, like every year prior, tickets are limited and will sell out. Begin the evening with passed hors d'oeuvre and the Paso Doble, then enjoy a four-course dinner served with a Vino Vargas wine that complements each dish. But don't despair, they do offer tasting previews prior to the ceremonious release date.

In addition to the sparkling wine, Vino Vargas currently offers chardonnay, pinot noir, grenache, a grenache-syrah-mourvedre blend, tempranillo, and cabernet sauvignon, along with two Port-style dessert wines – a red and a white.

A white Port? Yes. Just as "Champagne" is a term that should only be used to describe wines from that region, "Port" describes the manner and origin of that wine. That's why Pedro is careful to describe these wines as "Port-style" dessert wines - they are made in the winery in the Paso Robles vinicultural area. The white Port-style wine is called "Oro" - Spanish for gold - that describes the color of this wine. Like a lateharvest dessert wine, Oro has flavors of honey, aromas of jasmine, and pairs very well with desserts such as Crème Brulee. Served cold, the Oro is crisp and refreshing to the palate, not syrup-sweet or overwhelming.

These wines are not available in your local grocery store, but you can taste, savor, and buy the wines by visiting Vino Vargas in their scenic,





The winery hosts around 20 weddings annually. An indoor ceremony holds 75 guests, while an outside ceremony and reception can sustain a maximum of 300 guests.





Come believe spirits from the dearly departed come back to this realm to provide advice to loved ones. Our altar is set up early in October to allow friends, family and visitors to experience this beautiful time of remembrance. They may come in and place a photo, light a candle and toast with a glass of wine, to the memory of their departed. When we started celebrating this holiday 11 years ago, we had to do some more explaining about the decor... now, thanks to movies and pop art, more people have some familiarity and want to honor their own loved ones and pets. We give them the place

to do that. It is truly a community altar. It started with an 8' altar and it's grown to a 24' display. We are adding more sugar skull and crafting workshops related to the holiday to our schedule this fall.




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Take a sip back in time



The history of wine on the Central Coast goes back to the time of the Franciscan Friars who traveled through California establishing Missions. Plantings in North County began around 1790 at the Asistencia on the Santa Margarita Ranch. Vines are still growing adjacent to the existing Asistencia today. The padres produced wine for their communion service and also made brandy, which they exported. Frenchman Pierre Hypolite Dallidet was first landowner to put in a vineyard and develop a commercial winery around 1853.

There is some debate as to which winey is the oldest in the Paso Robles appellation. Some historical writings say it was planted by Andrew York, a rancher from Indiana who planted a Zinfandel vineyard in the late 1870s that eventually led him to establishing Ascension Winery that later became York Mountain Winery. It can claim the title of being the oldest continuously operating winery in North County, but only thanks to being purchased by Epoch Winery in 2010.

The original four wineries in Paso Robles were Rotta, York, Pesenti, and Martinelli. Only Rotta winery operates under the same name to this day. Pesenti winery has since become Turley Wine Cellars.

Polish pianist Ignace Paderewski purchased 2,000 acres in the Adelaida area in the early 1920s. He planted petite sirah and zinfandel, and following prohibition had his wine made at York Mountain Winery. Paderewski's Rancho San Ignacio grapes became award winners and gained the Paso

Robles wine region a reputation as a premier wine growing area.

Derby Wine Estates preserves historic almond tower

The historic Almond Tower building, located at 525 Riverside Avenue in Paso Robles, was originally constructed by the Paso Robles Almond Growers Association as a warehouse and processing plant for almonds. After some decline in the local almond industry, K.B. Nelson, a representative of the Farmers Alliance Business Association, purchased the building in 1936. For 84 years the FABA owned and operated the grain brokerage out of the building, closing their doors in 1975.

The historic building remained empty for ten years, until 1985. In 1985 it became "Riverside Centre" and was home to various businesses such as an appliance repair shop and a drywall storage business. For a short time, the building was owned by Smart and Final, who wanted to demolish the tower, but, after locals bound together in protest, and managed to get the building registered as a historical landmark, the demolition permits were pulled.

Ray and Pam Derby, who moved to the Central Coast in the early 1990s with the intention of retiring, purchased the building that is home to Derby Wine Estates in 2010. The Derbys took over this historic but derelict building after it stood vacant for 30 years, transformed it back to its original glory, and created a full production winery and tasting room.

Hearst Ranch Winery offers tastings at two historic locations

Hearst Ranch Winery's San Simeon tasting room shares space with one of the county's oldest Post Offices and Sebastian's Deli. The building was constructed in 1852 and was originally located on the cliff, about halfway out to "The Point" in San Simeon Bay. It was re-located in the early 1860's, with the help of horse drawn skids and lots of manual labor. Inside the building are antiques and vintage

pictures of the area during the beginnings of the Hearst family ownership.

Hearst's new Jack Ranch tasting room on Highway 46 East in Cholame also celebrates history. The James Dean Memorial is located on the site; a dedication and tribute to the young actor who passed away well before his time, close to the location of the tasting room.


The tasting room in Cholame is located within the Jack Ranch Cafe, another one of the oldest buildings in the county, still operating as a small, family style restaurant. Rumor has it that Jack Ranch Cafe was one of the "first ever" drive-thru food restaurants, where patrons would ride their horse up to the window to order and pick up their food as it was delivered down a wooden slide.

Rotta winery has been in operation since 1908

Rotta Winery has been around since 1908 and is known for its zinfandel, a wine that the Rotta family was able to continue making and selling during prohibition since it was used as a communion wine. In fact, many local vineyards made communion wine during prohibition.

Although it is not the oldest winery in the Paso Robles area – it was one of the first three. The winery was purchased from Frenchman Adolph Siot, who planted the first grapes and produced the first wine in Templeton. The winery was owned by the Rotta family until being sold to Jason Shorrock a few years ago.


